Another successful conclusion to this year's 'Great Ansty Spring Clean'



On Saturday 30th March, 2019, another enthusiastic team of 15 villagers gathered at the Ansty Maypole to take part in 'The Great British Spring Clean' supported (in part) by Wiltshire Council. For a while it looked as though the event wasn't going to be supported by Wiltshire Council in the wake of the Novichok incident last year – but at the last minute we were given the go ahead for our 'Ansty Volunteer Community Litter Pick' from Wiltshire Council's Community Engagement Officer.

What used to be down to prevailing 'common sense' (understandably after the Novichok incident in Salisbury last March) now meant that the parish council organisers had to comply with Wiltshire

Council procedures including a detailed risk assessment and general guidance.

These aspects were duly covered from all angles: via emails, our village website and again verbally on the day. The village event was organised by members of Ansty Parish Council. The willing volunteers were split up into two groups who then proceeded (in sunny and warm conditions) to clear the High street (north and south) picking up plastic bottles, beer cans, glass bottles, wrappers, aluminium cans and a whole host of other garbage.

The day was a far cry from last year's event when the weather was damp and cold. Litter at the southern end of the street towards the A 30 junction remained particularly disappointing – but not nearly as bad as last year by any means! Some seven or eight large refuse bags of rubbish were eventually collected and deposited at a small temporary waste depot in Ansty.

Such was the enthusiasm of the assembled company that the mission was accomplished in about one hour! Many thanks are due to all those villagers who turned up on the day and gave us some of their valuable time – including those stalwarts who cleared the church grounds. Ansty's May Day 2019 celebrations were a resounding success!

Earlier in the day rain had threatened to dampen May Day festivities in the pretty village of Ansty, Wiltshire. However, the damp weather cleared and it quickly dried up and once again the well-loved 'Ansty May' celebrations got under away in time honoured tradition.

The current 50 ft. (15.2 m) maypole had been decorated with coloured bunting and ribbons along with a beautifully adorned hay wain.

Ansty villagers along with locals from the surrounding area in this corner of South Wiltshire had formed a considerable crowd on the closed high Street from the Commandery down to the Maypole to watch the procession of the May King, his attendant and the 18 or so young Maypole Dancers admirably coached by Wendy Spencer-Smith (creative fitness.co.uk). The parade was led by Mr Mark Dunkley – as Master of Ceremonies.

Villagers manned stalls selling a range of items from home produce to hats, jewellery and plants. There was a bar and plenty of refreshments, along with a raffle. The entertainment included plenty of traditional live music, Morris Dancing and of course the main highlight of the evening were the children dancing around Ansty's famous Maypole before the crowning of the May King, 11 years old George Morgan from Ansty and his attendant Grace Spencer-Smith from Tisbury.

It was a very agreeable evening and thanks are due to all those who organised or indeed took part in making this event such a success. Another wonderful page of Ansty May Day history has been added to the many hundreds that have already been writ through the centuries past. Well done everybody!

Any profits from the evening's event go toward the 'next Maypole fund'.



It was with much sadness that we received news of the death of two ladies at the beginning of July who were very much part of Ansty village for a long time. Hazel Green, wife of Tony of Waterloo Farm, Ansty and Pat Hamshere, wife of Brian, Arundell Cottage, Ansty.



Pat's funeral was held at Salisbury Crematorium on Thursday 18th July 2019 at 11.30 am. All of us who knew Pat remember such a happy, smiling lady who lightened your day every time you met her. Indeed, her warm presence still enveloped all who were present at the service. Son Richard, her 'one and only' paid a moving tribute to his mother articulating how much Pat loved people and how, along with his father Brian enjoyed being a publican (at the Maypole) as well as being a great cake and pastry chef. A moving poem 'To Those Whom I Loved And To Those Who Loved Me' read by Elizabeth Shaw reduced many of the congregation to tears. It so reflected Pat in life.

Hazel came from Semley and her family are buried there. She was a big part of the local farming and equine loving community. She and Tony farmed at Waterloo Farm (when it was a much larger concern) all their married life – over 60 years. Hazel loved her horses and rode the bridleways and lanes regularly and was a great supporter of point to point racing.

The short ceremony which started at 15.00 pm included the unveiling of the CPRE BKVC standard and Shield and the presentation of several awards by various dignitaries representing the 'Campaign to Protect Rural England'
(Wiltshire CPRE), Wiltshire Council and the Hills Group –
one of the main sponsors of the event.

In absolutely gorgeous warm and sunny weather an enthusiastic crowd of Ansty villagers beamed proudly as the CPRE Standard and Shield was unveiled by Mr. David Scott, the Wiltshire High Sheriff.




Another successful Harvest Supper held in The Commandery, Ansty.

Cranborne Chase has become the 14th
Reserve across the globe and joins an
exclusive club of International Union for the
Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Protected
Areas to gain international recognition for
our dark skies. What a stunning
achievement! Well done to all of the
Cranborne Chase AONB officers who spent
years putting the 'Dark Skies Reserve' bid
together and then successfully campaigning
throughout the area to persuade people to pledge their

support for the bid.

Here in Ansty, some villagers along with Parish Council supported the bid after Amanda Scott (one of the Dark Sky advisors) gave an interesting presentation at a Parish meeting that outlined what the bid was about and what we could all do to keep light pollution to the minimum. Thank you Amanda!

"Some people are lucky enough to recognise 'the Plough', but for others, seeing stars and their constellations is often impossible because of light pollution. Here in Cranborne Chase we can see the Milky Way and the Andromeda galaxy, if the clouds allow!" said Linda Nunn, Director of Cranborne Chase AONB.

Bob Mizon, who leads the Commission for Dark Skies in the UK and has played a major supporting role in the application, added: "You can't fail to be amazed by the show the night sky puts on when you're in Cranborne Chase AONB on a clear night."

There are several outstanding localities in and around Ansty where one can gaze skywards and pick out a huge number of stars, constellations and planets of the solar system.

This dark sky status will certainly help to keep it that way for future generations.


