









## Welcome to January 2021 – the Covid crisis continues with another long lockdown looming

Barely a fortnight after Christmas 2020, the whole of the UK found itself under covid-19 lockdown restrictions again - so soon after a previous 'shorter lockdown' in November 2020. For most people the 'third' lockdown was merely a continuation of the November shutdown.

The writing was on the wall when after the Christmas break when over 80,000 people tested positive with coronavirus on Dec 29<sup>th</sup>, 2020. Worse still, new 'variants' of the virus were being detected that were more transmissible than the old virus.

On 5<sup>th</sup> January, the UK government imposed a strict lockdown (in England) that was to last until the end of March at the earliest. Schools and colleges closed: students worked at home 'online' and people were told to 'stay at home' and only leave home to buy food, obtain medicine and undertake exercise just once a day. 2021 GCSE and A level exams were cancelled. Those that could worked from home. 79% of the population supported these measures – but more people paid less attention to the rules than did during the first lockdown back in March 2020.

Hospitalizations shot up, as did the death rate from the virus and the NHS realised that they were going to badly impacted.

The only good news was that the vaccine roll-out that began in late December was forging ahead thanks to an astonishing number of volunteers who rapidly answered the call to help vaccination centres to function smoothly and help medics administer the does. The first Pfizer jab in the world was given to Margaret Keenan on December 8<sup>th</sup>, 2020, and the first Astra Zeneca was delivered to an 82-year-old in Oxford on January 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2021.

By January 1<sup>st</sup> a million jabs had been given to UK citizens over 80 and vaccination centres were popping up all over the place – or nearest big

centre was in Wilton. The target was to get all care home residents, carers, over 80s, frontline medics, clinically vulnerable and over 70s vaccinated with a first jab by mid-February. The second jab would follow on within 12 weeks.

At the time of the third major lockdown in January over 75,400 covid-19 deaths had been reported with almost 60,000 positive cases per day. There was no other way to avoid a lockdown. The mood across the country and in Ansty was decidedly gloomy – along with the weather! By mid-January the UK deaths were rising rapidly but the infection rate was starting to show signs of dropping. Vaccinations for the over 70s started on January 17<sup>th</sup>. Two grim milestone were passed January: on 19<sup>th</sup> 1,359 people died because of catching Covid-19 and on 26<sup>th</sup> when deaths from Covid-19 passed 100,000.

At the end of January, we began to see extraordinary behaviour from the EU over the sluggish roll-out of their vaccine programme: their ponderous administration had not prepared properly for the eventuality, and they sought to blame the UK.

All media outlets continued (as they had done throughout 2020) to aggressively question and sometimes denigrate the government, 'holding them to account' - often putting forward their own covid plans and opinions and frankly it all just got in the way and confused large sections of the public whilst stirring up trouble in other quarters.

The devolved nations generally followed the government line but made sure that they tweaked the rules to suit their own agendas. It was going to cost an eye watering amount of borrowed money – far more than any financial crash seen in history.





















## January 2021 Weather Report (posted 31-01-2021)

Overall, January turned out to be 'near average' instead of the usual 'another mild/warm month' that we have got used to! Two cold spells were cancelled out by two mild spells! The mean monthly temperature was 3.7 C – just 0.2 of a centigrade degree below the long-term average. There were no exceptionally cold nights or warm days. Rainfall, however, did exceed the long-term monthly average of 3.64 in. This month clocked in 4.25 in. Click on image for all the statistics!

# Another Month; another Covid-19 'Lockdown'. Welcome to February 2021

In early February, the EU tightens travel restrictions on places outside of the block, with only travellers from countries with very low cases to cut down spread of new covid-19 variants that were appearing. Some nations like Poland, Switzerland and some EU nations were raising questions about the efficacy of the AstraZeneca vaccine, but a study here suggests the Oxford/Astra Zeneca vaccine provides sustained protection against Covid-19 for at least three months and cuts transmission of the virus by two-thirds. AstraZeneca then warns that their vaccine had a significantly reduced efficacy against a South African variant of coronavirus, whereupon South Africa suspends the use of this vaccine.

By Feb 8<sup>th</sup> the WHO tells nations not to dismiss the AstraZeneca vaccine – but the political doubts had been sown. The UK death rate or infection rates were dropping gradually, but the NHS was still very much overwhelmed with just under 30,000 patients in hospital. The WHO announces it was going to investigate the source of the infection in China. The rest of us knew that nothing would come of it – except what we already know. The WHO also endorsed the use of the AstraZeneca vaccine even though a lot of European countries had restricted its use.

By mid-February, many countries across the developed nations were still in no hurry to begin looking at the easing of lockdowns. The infection R Rate drops below 1 for the first time since July 2020. Prime Minister Boris Johnson announces that he is optimistic that his announcement of his roadmap out of lockdown on the 22<sup>nd</sup> February will include easing of restrictions. The media latched on to this vision about things rapidly going back to normal (as if!).

On February 15<sup>th</sup>, 15 million Britons had now received their first dose of a covid-19 vaccine – the result of fantastic organisation by the authorities, the NHS and an army of volunteers being able to open vaccine centres up and down the country including our nearest one at Wilton. Nobody thanked the government or the scientists and public health managers for being instrumental in organising the logistics behind this success and reaching this target they had set back in December 2020.

There was talk of issuing vaccine certificates to allow people free movement between countries in various world regions. The often-maligned AstraZeneca vaccine carries on unabated: South Africa now offers its doses of the Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine to the African Union after suspending its use of the vaccine due to efficacy concerns.

By February 18<sup>th</sup> it was announced that global coronavirus infections had fallen to their lowest level since the mid October 2020. In some countries there was concern that not enough people were prepared to take up the vaccine offer – possibly putting themselves and others in danger. A couple of days later it was announced that all adults in the UK will be offered a first dose of a coronavirus vaccine by the end of July 2021.

February 22<sup>nd</sup> saw the USA coronavirus death toll pass half a million. The UK government announces a 4-stage roadmap to lift England out of lockdown over 4 months. Schools would reopen and outdoor socialising with one other person allowed from 8<sup>th</sup> of March. The devolved nations tweaked out their own roadmaps following similar lines. It was becoming increasingly obvious that a large minority of people in the UK were frankly ignoring this cautious approach and were virtually carrying on 'as normal'. We had become a very 'disunited' Kingdom. Data showed that transmission of coronavirus and deaths from it was dropping quickly in the population that had received their first jab. Evidence continues to support that Pfizer and Astra Zeneca vaccines are robust and very effective against Covid strains so far identified. Europe still thought otherwise re Astra Zeneca: they will not use it! Too many EU citizens were apparently becoming 'vaccine hesitant' fed on a diet of social media pap and political dithering.

In the UK on February 28<sup>th</sup> there were 6,035 Coronavirus cases; 122, 849 deaths and 20 million vaccinated so far (first dose)



country. There was also the news of the shaping up of a road plan for 'Freedom Day' mooted for some time in July or earlier. It was noted that not all the population were taking up the vaccination plea.

# Another Month, still in Covid-19 'Lockdown'. Welcome to March 2021

Early March saw more panic in the UK as a new 'Brazil' strain is discovered. So far only a very few cases. Valiant attempts made to isolate people by surge test and trace.

The Government was able to announce that just the one jab of vaccine was bringing down hospital cases dramatically. Meanwhile Rishi Sunak, the Chancellor of Exchequer further extended the furlough scheme to give support to the self-employed. Eye watering sums of money have now been borrowed by the Government. On budget day a further £65 billion was found to further boost the economy – but there was a hint that taxes may rise

On May 5<sup>th</sup> it was reported that the EU was turning on the use of our Astra Zeneca – amounting to what appeared to be unsavoury political point scoring against the British vaccine roll-out success by trying to undermine the take-up of the vaccine because of 'concerns'. Over a million people may need treatment for the after-effects of covid.

March 8<sup>th</sup> saw schoolchildren going back to school after months of home schooling online. Teachers talked of a big rise in mental health problems in children.

The EU continued to trouble Astra Zeneca and 'safety' and supplies- still failing to realise that they did not get their orders in early enough. Nor could their own factories meet the supply demand. The rumblings went on for days with suspensions and concerns about the safety of the vaccine and a large minority of EU citizens unsurprisingly didn't want the Astra Zeneca jab anyway – after unsubtle suggestions from some leaders that it wasn't good enough. Many commentators recognised that the Astra Zeneca jab had been weaponised by the major EU leaders. Ironically the EU regulator for vaccines said the Astra Zeneca vaccine was 'absolutely safe'.

By mid-March it seemed inevitable that much of the continent was facing another serious wave of covid-infections. Meanwhile our vaccination rollout went on successfully although there were hints that there would be a slowdown of vaccine due to production issues and demands for the vaccine elsewhere.

It was also announced that Britain was set to jab all adults by early June. Spirits were boosted as people were told that we are on the road to freedom. Later the scientists were more cautious.

Over the weekend of March 20<sup>th</sup> much was made of how our resilience has apparently improved with the success of the vaccine programme in the UK - up to ¾ million jabs in one day. This upsurge in community spirit was tempered by protestors in Bristol and London – seemingly unable to view the bigger picture of working together with the majority to help a common cause.

The government warned people in the UK that Europe's third wave will affect the UK. The ponderous EU political machine was in plain disarray with their vaccine procurement, manufacture and indeed vaccine take-up by their population and their conflicting nationalistic approach to tackling the surging coronavirus cases. They actively sought to downgrade our AstraZeneca vaccine (paid for by our taxpayers and supplied at cost not for profit) whilst stating we should send more of our supplies their way

On March 23<sup>rd</sup>, the UK took part in a 'candle of remembrance' where people stood on their doorsteps with a torch or candle to remember the 126,000 lives lost to the pandemic. Rumbles continued throughout Europe about vaccines – but some in the bloc were beginning to realise the errors were entirely of their own making

March 28<sup>th</sup> UK hits 30 million coronavirus vaccinations. March 30<sup>th</sup> Germany restricts the use of AstraZeneca to the over 60s only – because of safety fears?

March 31<sup>st</sup>: UK 4,052 daily coronavirus cases; 126, 713 deaths since the start of the pandemic. In Wiltshire cases down to 25/100,00 and to date 16,822 cases.



March. There were spats with the EU over the deployment of our Astra Zeneca vaccine resulting in the 'weaponising' and ultimate distrust of the vaccine world-wide.

#### Introducing 'Tis the Future': Refill, Reuse, Reduce, Reimagine (updated 05-03-2021)



We all acknowledge that we need to do more to reverse climate change and halt the decline of our environment. Well, here is a local based initiative that hopes to show us the way forward that is set to become operational in the New Year. Set up by group called the Tisbury Community Benefit Society a zero-plastic, electric powered, mobile refill shop — community owned and community run — will visit local villages, including Ansty and stop for an hour. The stopping place in Ansty will be the Maypole area. 'Tis the Future' will initially be selling purely staple store cupboard ingredients such as rice, oats, flour, pasta, and cereals etc. Click on the vehicle image for all the details and a timetable.



#### Beware of the Mole Traps! (05-03-2021)

Some folk walking in the fields above Ansty Coombe may have noticed lots of molehills appearing on some of the slopes. Mole activity can become a nuisance if left and they damage functional areas such as pastureland. Moles are most active in early spring and occasionally mole catchers are called in to deal with them. Walkers (and their dogs) are asked to avoid going near any traps they see as they could cause injury to persons or animals. The advice is to keep away and stick to the public footpaths and remember that these fields are classed as private land and they are not

classed as accessible open space!



#### Ansty May Day celebrations very much restricted this year. (updated 06-03-2021)

It looks very much as though we will be unable to hold any sort of group event again for this year's Ansty May Day due to Covid-19 restrictions. By May 1st we will still be in the second phase of the easing down of restrictions where the 'rule of six' for gatherings outside and the 'stay at home rule' becomes 'stay local' will be in operation. Even the third stage which starts on May 17th at the earliest, outdoor group meetings are limited to just 30.

The May Day committee have agreed that this year's May Queen elect, Alice Morgan, from Ansty, will be crowned at the Maypole on May 1st at an unspecified time and within the restrictions.

Some locals may wish to tie flowers on the Maypole on this day to mark this longstanding village tradition, perhaps when they are out for exercise but remember social distancing will still be important until June 21st at the earliest!



#### New Land Management Plan for Ansty Coombe Meadows! (posted 10-03-2021)

There is a plan afoot to restore pasture meadows above Ansty Coombe back to their former glory restoring and conserving the historical character of these ancient hay and wildflower meadows. #### It looks like a green light for the Improvement of 'Broadband' in Ansty - the latest important update... (posted 26-03-2021)

As some of us know only too well, the 'broadband service' in Ansty varies from fantastic for a few to mostly frustratingly poor for the rest!

Back into last year Tim Martin, chairman of Ansty Parish Council endeavoured to plough through the various government schemes to try and take advantage of the Fibre Broadband already installed in Ansty – but not readily available to most residents in the parish. This meant a degree of collective self-help and 16 households eventually expressed an interest into entering a contract with broadband provider. Eventually Wessex Internet took up the challenge and the latest news is that Wessex Internet has now requested 16 x Rural Gigabit Vouchers in Ansty (with 3 further registrations of interest to follow up.) The Planning Manager at Wessex Internet is currently pencilling in a work schedule for the fibre installation to households who signed up for the end of this summer – subject to access being agreed.

#### Two Ansty Parish Councillors not seeking re-election in May poll. (posted 27-03-2021)

Councillor Mathew Feltham and Councillor Rob Wilkinson have both announced that they will not be putting themselves forward as candidates to serve another term on Ansty Parish Council in the forthcoming local elections on May 6th. Both men have enjoyed their public service stint working for the best interests of Ansty village since 2017. Chairman of Ansty Parish Council Mr Tim Martin is now urging other villagers to put themselves forward to help take Ansty through the next 4 years – perhaps with fresh ideas to offer. The closing date for nominations is April 8th.

# Government Road Plan to ease restrictions 'on target'. Welcome to April 2021

April 1st Take up of the Astra Zeneca remains low as public confidence within Europe drops. Several nations in the EU experiencing surges of covid infections and lockdowns are mooted. Other countries in the world are experiencing similar new 'wave' surges.

April 5<sup>th</sup> UK Government confirms that the UK's roadmap for the easing of lockdown restrictions will go ahead as planned on April 12th. Plans to test all people twice weekly for all people who want it are to go ahead.

Turkey and Brazil were in a bad way with huge surges in coronavirus cases and in the case of Brazil over 4,000 deaths recorded in a single day from the disease. In Scotland the number of deaths passes 10,000 on April 8<sup>th.</sup> The tiny risk of blood clots allegedly associated with some vaccines, including Astra Zeneca was constantly amplified by the media effectively damaging public confidence even further. Australia and Sicily steer away from using the AZ vaccine.

On April 12<sup>th</sup> UK begins vaccinating the over 40s, whilst non-essential shops, gyms and pubs reopen in England. Ireland restricts the use of the AZ vaccine to the over 60s.

Problems arise with the Johnson & Johnson vaccine in another case of rare blood clots being caused by the vaccine. Once gain the EU, along with Canada and the US temporarily pause the use of the vaccine. Sweden now has the highest covid-19 case rate in Europe.

The WHO warns that Covid is on the rise in many countries and there was a new variant to worry about

On April 15<sup>th</sup> it was announced that 77 cases of a Covid-19 Variant first identified in India was found in the UK. Meanwhile thousands were travelling to and from the UK to India with no checks at the UK border. France becomes the eighth country to pass a 100,000-person death toll from coronavirus. Some World leaders called for intellectual property rules for vaccines to be waived. Here in Britain the AZ vaccine was basically funded 'at cost' by the taxpayer and it was hoped to be able to distribute the vaccine worldwide eventually. Unfortunately,

bad press and politics ensured that the vaccine – which seems to be as sound as the others – is not a favourite. Latvia offered the AZ vaccine to clear it out of storage due to hesitancy. Sweden offered an alternative vaccine to people who had a first dose of AZ vaccine.

April 15<sup>th</sup> - global death rate reaches 3 million.

April 21<sup>st</sup> Greece announces it plans to reopen for tourism from 15th May. Meanwhile more cases of 'Indian variant' found in Britain. Low numbers it is true – surge testing and isolation techniques were applied. Will this succeed or will we have another dominant variant?

April 24<sup>th</sup> 50% of the UK population by now have had their first dose of a covid-19 vaccine. Germany, Kuwait and Iran ban travellers from India as their toll (with the variant taking hold rises astronomically. The UK did not ban travellers from India, but they did send equipment including ventilators to that stricken country. The EU launches legal action against the AZ vaccine company (after roundly and comprehensively rubbishing it) for failing to fulfil its contracts; what nonsense.

April 29<sup>th</sup> UK secures 60 M doses of the Pfizer vaccine to be used as booster shots from the Autumn. 400,000 people have now died from Covid-19 in Brazil. India records a one-day total of 370, 000 infections and over 3,000 deaths. This was to go on for several more days at this rate and even higher.

The undoubted success highlighted this month is the dramatic fall in the number of hospitalisations from Covid and the much lower number deaths per day – now averaging about 10. By the end of April 4.4 million people in the UK had contracted the covid-19 virus but the rate had slowed down considerably.

The total number of UK deaths stood at 127, 580 – but at least we were slipping down the 'top ten' table. The weekly death rate in Wiltshire was now extremely low and the cumulative death total since the beginning of the pandemic stood at 373.



The generally uplifting headlines of March continued into April, but familiar carping was becoming more prevalent as various headlines started to challenge and undermine the government again — citing the need for an inquiry into 'pandemic mistakes'; the need to keep testing; for and against 'covid passports and questioning whether the freedom promised was ever going to arrive. There was also a recognition that the covid virus directly and indirectly was having a very big effect on the mental health of the population at large. Government ministers appeared beleaguered and weary at times and no wonder!

#### New! The latest Ansty monthly weather statistics have been compiled for April 2021. (posted 31-04-2021)



April 2021 was cool; very dry; very sunny and exceptionally frosty! More frosts recorded than any winter month this year! In every respect April turned out to be an exceptional month. Anticyclonic conditions prevailed throughout often pulling in cold and dry arctic air – replacing warm air that washed over us at the end of March. The statistics were confounding – only the April of 1938 was drier, and no April has recorded so many frosts since records began! Click on the image for all the latest figures!

## Welcome to May 2021

## Restrictions easing; infections and death rate from Covid reaches a welcome low.

May 1<sup>st</sup>. It transpires that daily covid-19 cases in India topped 400,000 per day and the variant identified there was extremely transmissible. Yet travel to and from India was still considered safe! UK sends more than a thousand ventilators to help India.

Meanwhile Denmark bans the Johnson and Johnson vaccine (because of the possibility of rare blood clots). Pfizer announces a £19bn turn-over in covid-vaccine sales. The USA said it will support a patent waiver on Covid-19 vaccines; France agrees but Germany does not. Other countries consider introducing vaccine 'passports' to enable travel to certain places or events.

May 6<sup>th</sup>. Brazil hits 15 million covid-19 cases. England's chief medical officer, Chris Witty, warns that that covid-19 is unlikely to be eradicated.

EU says it will not renew its orders for the AZ vaccine – despite opening further court proceedings against the firm for allegedly not producing the goods.

May 10<sup>th</sup>. WHO classifies the B.1.617 variant first identified in India as a variant of global concern.

Norway ditches the AstraZeneca vaccine

May 13<sup>th</sup> Prime Minister Boris Johnson warns that the Indian variant is of a worrying concern – as the UK strain of the virus doubles in a week. But the UK government would respond coolly and calmly to this threat. Many countries were in various states of lockdown; vaccine pauses; alerts or states of emergency due to the ever-shifting threats of the coronavirus.

May 16<sup>th</sup> hints are given that the easing of lockdown in the UK may have to be halted. Germany scraps its covid vaccine priority lists and opens to 'all comers'.

Pfizer invests 40 M dollars in a vaccine centre in Eire. G20 leaders back vaccine voluntary licenses but not a patent waver. Germany declares the UK as a variant virus region. India objects to the Indian covid variant being referred to as the Indian variant. IMF proposes 50 B dollars to end pandemic by vaccinating 40% of the world population by end of 2021.

May 22nd UK's health secretary confirms that two doses of vaccine effective against the Indian variant (indeed any variant so far discovered). UK has now put 60 million jabs into the arms of its population.

The spectre that covid-19 escaped from a lab in Wuhan raised again in the USA. Of course, China denies the claim. In any case, what is done is done.

May 26<sup>th</sup> Many countries now trying to ease restrictions but there are still pockets of wave surges taking place. EU seeks court order to force AstraZeneca to deliver millions more vaccines to the bloc despite apparently ditching it!

May 29<sup>th</sup> Data shows more than half of people in their 30's in England received the first dose of Covid-19 vaccine in the second half of May. Scientists warn ministers that a third wave may have already started in the UK. Data shows that only 1% of the 1.3 billion vaccines injected globally have been administered in Africa. The huge covid infection wave in India is now receding.

On May 31<sup>st</sup> only 7 deaths were recorded for the whole of the UK – a downward trend that continued throughout the month. The cumulative UK death total stood at 127, 829, a rise of about 250 Over the month. But the number of coronavirus infections was clearly rising especially amongst much younger people. The figures for Wiltshire remained very low. Some experts warned that Britain was about to enter another wave of infections...

Most of us surely thought in May that we had seen our way through the Covid gloom, and that 'normal service' was about to resume.

The weather was generally kind with plenty of blue skies and sunshine and people were beginning to get out and about and visiting family and friends once gain. The creative Arts businesses and hospitality were seeing customers returning and everything looked fine until a new Covid-19 variant showed up - first detected in India. It wasn't long before this variant – which became known as the Delta variant embedded itself into our psyche.

It dawned on most of us that Covid was going to be with us forever. There will be further waves and restrictions and alas more illness and deaths.

# The Ansty May Day Event Cancelled.

This year's May Day committee realised back in March that we would be unable to hold any sort of group event again for this year's Ansty May Day due to Covid-19 restrictions. By May 1st we will still be in the second phase of the easing down of restrictions where the 'rule of six' for gatherings outside and the 'stay at home rule' becomes 'stay local' will be in operation. Even the third stage which starts on May 17th at the earliest, outdoor group meetings are limited to just 30. Hence this year's May Day event was cancelled! This was originally announced on the website in late March – into April.



The May Day committee has agreed, however, that this year's May Queen elect, Alice Morgan, from Ansty, will be crowned at the Maypole on May 1st at an unspecified time and within the restrictions. Some locals may wish to tie flowers on the Maypole on this day to keep this longstanding village tradition 'live' – perhaps when they are out for exercise but remember social distancing will still be important until June 21st at the earliest!

May 2021 will be remembered for all the wrong reasons! It turned out to be a cool month and a very wet one too! The cool nature carried on from April, unusual itself for the number of frosts it had! In the end, no records were broken in our locality, but May was decidedly wretched and not the tonic that matched last year's May we were all hoping for after the dismal winter months and the drawn out Covid 19 pandemic restrictions. ## Welcome to June 2021 ...

# Optimism at the end of May that the Covid-19 Coronavirus was in decline was misplaced although the vaccine roll-out was a great success....

June 1st.Britain records no new deaths within 28 days of a positive Covid-19 test for the first time since July 2020. The World Health Organisation approves the Chinese Sinovac vaccine for emergency use. On the other hand, we were logging up about 5,000 new covid cases/day and this was rising daily.

June 3rd – 5th After the elation of no deaths being reported UK on June 1st reports its highest number of new cases in one day since March 2021. Wales announces plans to ease lockdown restrictions on June 7. Portugal removed from the UK Government's 'green list' of destinations. UEFA announces that it is in talks with the UK Government about easing restrictions for overseas supporters during the knockout stages of the Euro 2020 championships. UK Government advisor has said it would "foolish" to go ahead with reopening on June 21. France announces it will allow tourists from the UK if they have had two vaccine doses. Prime Minister Boris Johnson will urge G7 leaders at the Summit to commit to global vaccination by the end of 2022. NHS boss says that the Delta variant is 'not significantly increasing' hospital numbers.

June 6th – 12th UK Health Secretary says that Ministers are open to delaying the reopening date of June 21 if the spread of the Delta variant worsens. Vaccine passports to be used for the first time in the UK at sporting events for England's Euro 2020 group games at Wembley. Pfizer begins testing its Covid-19 vaccine on a larger cohort of children under 12.

ONS estimates that 80% of adults in the UK have Covid-19 antibodies. Government data suggests Covid-19 cases in England are rising at their fastest rate since the winter wave. Prime Minister Johnson warns that the spread of the Delta variant of Covid-19 is of 'serious concern'.

June 13th – 18th G7 leaders call for an investigation into the origins of the Covid-19 pandemic. G7 pledges 870 million vaccine doses to COVAX. England delays the lifting of Covid-19 restrictions by four weeks. First Minister, Nicola Sturgeon, says further

relaxation of Covid-19 restrictions likely to be delayed by three weeks. MPs in England approve regulations to delay easing of lockdown restrictions to 19th July. Wales postpones relaxation of coronavirus restrictions by four weeks, as Delta variant causes cases to surge. 350 Indonesian doctors have contracted Covid-19 despite receiving China's Sinovac vaccine. WHO Chief Scientist says the Delta variant of Covid-19 is becoming the globally dominant variant of the disease.

June 19th – 22nd. Brazil passes 500,000 Covid-19 related deaths, as protestors take to the streets over President Bolsonaro's handling of the pandemic. China hits one billion vaccines delivered. Mandatory mask-wearing and nightly curfew ends in France today. UK confirms it is working on a booster vaccination programme. Many countries in the EU have imposed restrictions on travellers from the UK to help stop the spread of the Delta variant.

By the end of June, we were effectively entering another wave with the delta variant of Covid the prominent virus variant. Hospitalisations which had dropped to below 1,000 in mid-May began to climb again towards the 2,000 by the end of June. However, deaths remained relatively low averaging about 16/day at the end of June. The intense vaccination programme seemed to be sheering off the need for massive intensive care. On the last day of June 50% of the population had been double jabbed; 68% of the population had received 1 dose or more. The cumulative death toll had risen to 128,140 a rise of some 311 over the month – a relative slight rise when compared with May. The number of deaths recorded in Wiltshire for the month was very low. Nevertheless, Wiltshire had recorded a cumulative total of deaths with Covid-19 on the death certificate as 847. Looking at the statistics we seemed to be back where we were in September/October 2020 in terms of deaths, but the number of delta variant infections has risen quite steeply in a similar fashion to that we found ourselves in the week before Christmas. The pandemic is still far from being over, but the vaccine is doing its job with far fewer people dying from covid.

Newspaper headlines in June wavered wildly between hope and uncertainty as the month progressed.

Just as the scientists and medics think they are winning the battle against covid-19 virus another variant appears threatening to unhinge plans to wind down most of the restrictions on June 21st.

At the top of most peoples' list was whether they would be able to book a holiday for this summer – especially abroad.

Nevertheless most people continued to act cautiously and found a new confidence that hasn't been around for 18 months when it came to visiting shops, cafes and visiting friends and family.



## Covid-19 UPDATE: LATEST ADVICE and other News. (updated 02-07-2021)



The latest Covid-19 statistics for Wiltshire has increased with 365 cases over the last 7 days, whilst the rate of cases per 100k has risen from 44.4 last week to 73 this week – below the national average for England but the numbers are climbing. Please keep playing your part to help keep these case numbers in check. The Delta variant is on a rapid increase, so we need to cautious.
