UK records more than 150,000 Covid deaths. (Posted 08-01-2022)

150,000 people in the UK have now died with Covid-19. It is a bleak, sobering figure after nearly two years of daily coronavirus statistics. But the problem with statistics, is that a person can forget that behind every number is a person.

The UK has reached another grim milestone in the pandemic, becoming the first country in Europe to surpass 150,000 coronavirus deaths. Some 150,057 people have died within 28 days of a positive Covid test since the pandemic began. The UK is the seventh country to pass 150,000 deaths, after the US, Brazil, India, Russia, Mexico, and Peru. Boris Johnson, the prime minister, said every death "is a profound loss to the friends and communities affected and my thoughts and condolences are with them".

We are truly fortunate in Ansty that such grim statistics have not affected our location and we would do well to reflect on this.







Extreme heat warning. Stay safe in the hot weather

We're currently in the middle of an Amber extreme heat warning issued by The Met Office with temperatures set to peak at 35C tomorrow, Saturday 13 August.

This means that people are likely to experience health effects, and not just those most vulnerable to extreme heat. To help in the hot weather, we've added some advice on how you can stay safe in the extreme heat on our website. We are also experiencing a meteorological drought and whilst Wiltshire hasn't been included in the first areas to be declared as having a drought, with the extreme weather warning in place we can all play our part by using water wisely at home.

With the warm, very dry weather continuing, Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service is reminding us of all to take extra care when enjoying the outdoors. They are asking that we don't have a bonfire at home while it's so dry. If it's necessary, have a garden hose to hand in case it starts to get out of control; site it well away from fencing, trees, and property; and never use an accelerant to get it started. Also, barbecue coals and fire pits stay hot for hours, so douse them with water and don't dispose of the remnants until you are sure they are cold. Better still, just don't use them! The same advice applies to activities in the tinder box dry countryside at large. Heath fires and farmland fires can be devastating too.

Art in the Barn at Furzelease Farm well supported by local folk! (posted 21-08-2022)




The latest Ansty monthly weather statistics have been compiled for SEPTEMBER 2022. (posted 01-10-2022)

Changes are afoot for St James Church. (posted 04-10-2022)



The latest Quinquennial Inspection Report (looking at the internal and external fabric of St James's Church building highlighted a whole list of issues one might associated with such an old building. A schedule of works has been drawn up to try and rectify some of the problems and detailed architect plans drawn up to show the areas of most concern. Lesley Simm was visiting an architect on 4th November 2022 to discuss the schedule of works and tendering a contract. Lesley stated this will take some time but is hoping that work may start in the

summer of 2023. Lesley added that it will be quite a big undertaking and at some stage the church will have to be emptied because all the lower concrete rendering inside the church has to come off and be replaced. Perhaps some of the services will be held in the open air!

A decision has also been taken to reduce the number of services being held at St James' to two per month. It is sad. Over the winter the cost of heating the church is a cost they can't take just now. Next summer the situation will be reviewed. The new service rota starts on January 1st, 2023.



'Carols by Candlelight' - A great start to this year's Christmas Celebrations! (posted 20-12-2022)


